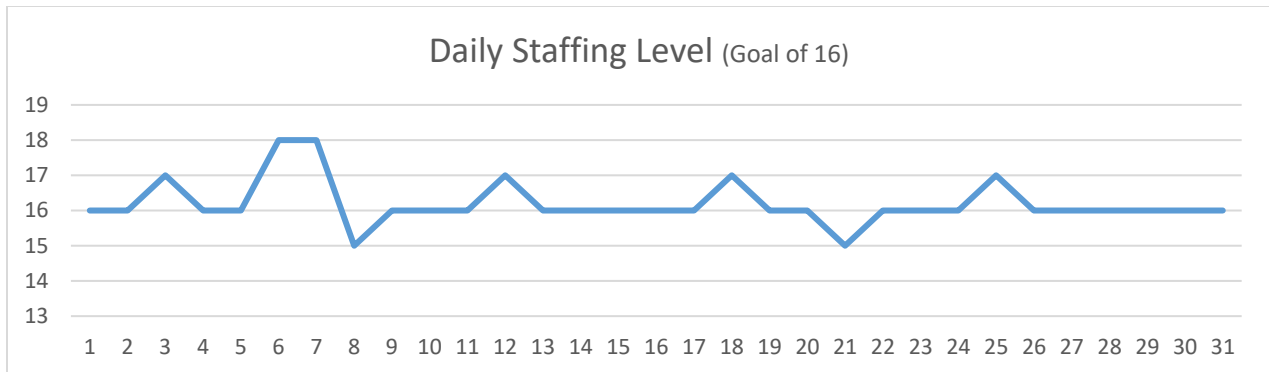

Total Calls for Service-695 (Average 22.41/Day) (7900 Calls for 2025)

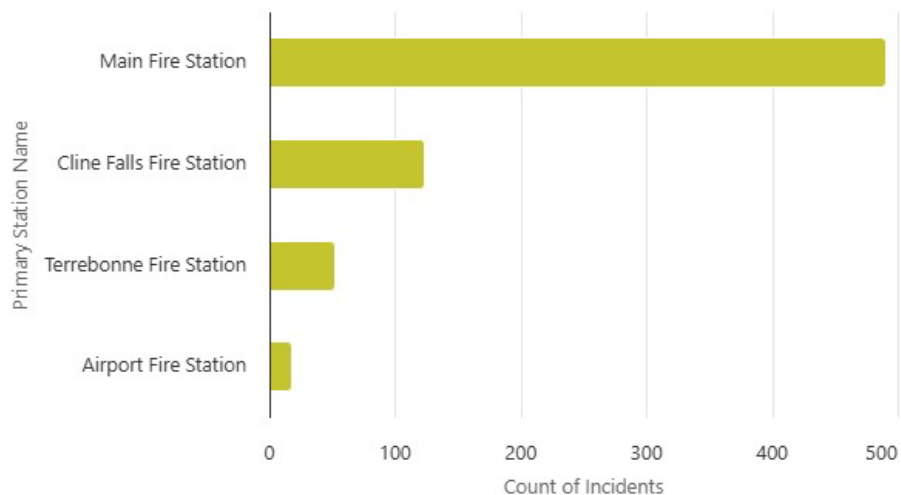

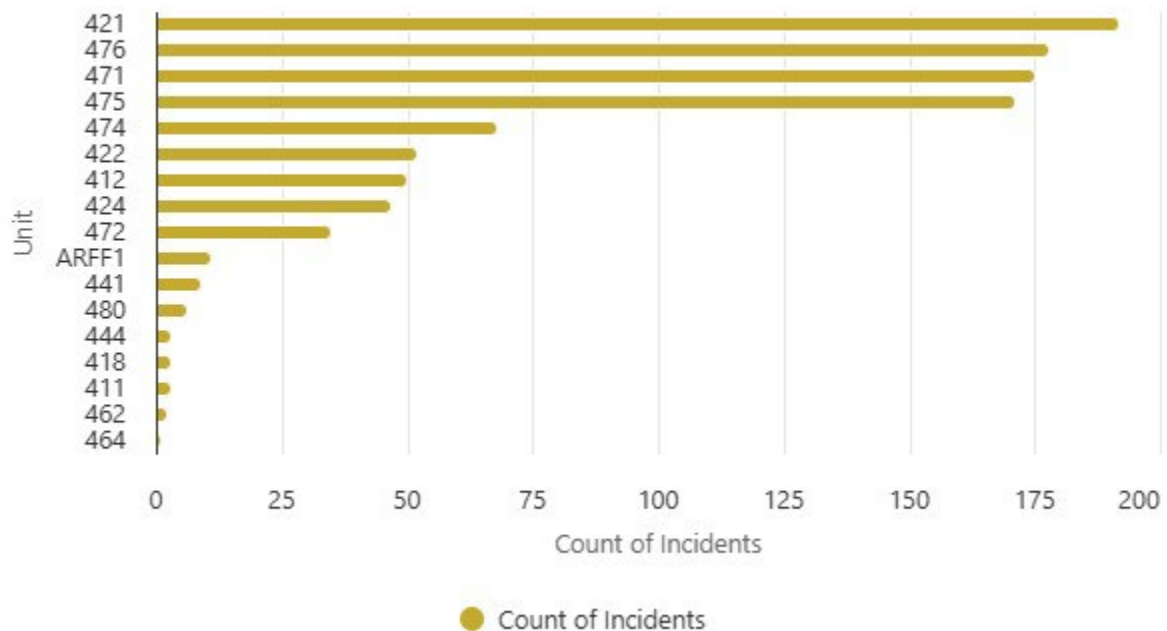

Dec 01, 2025 to Dec 31, 2025



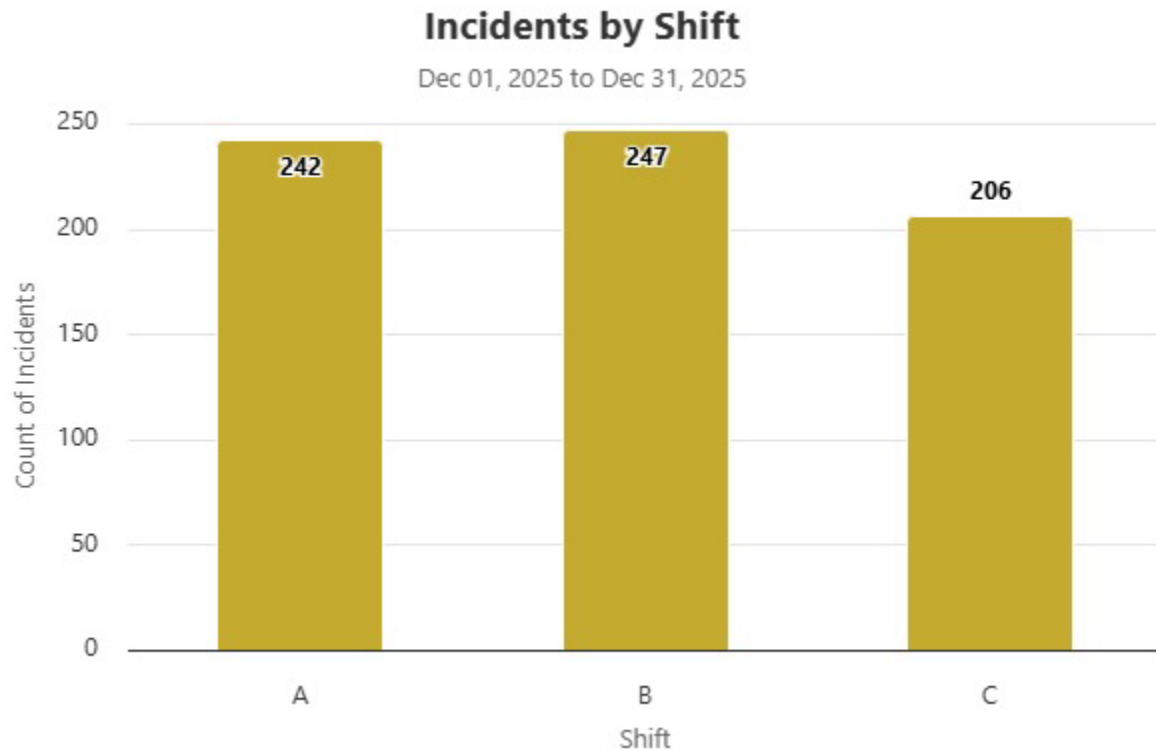

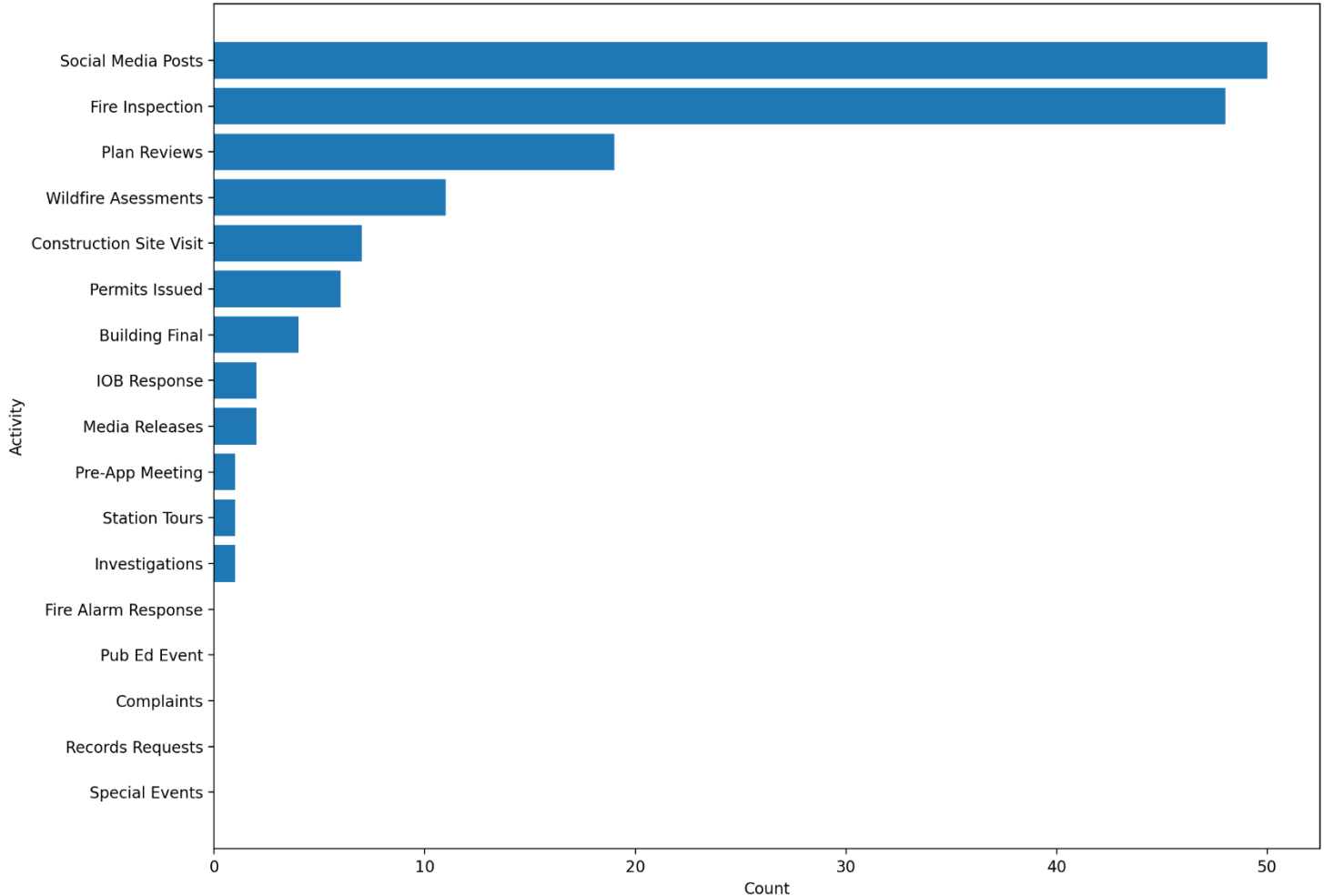

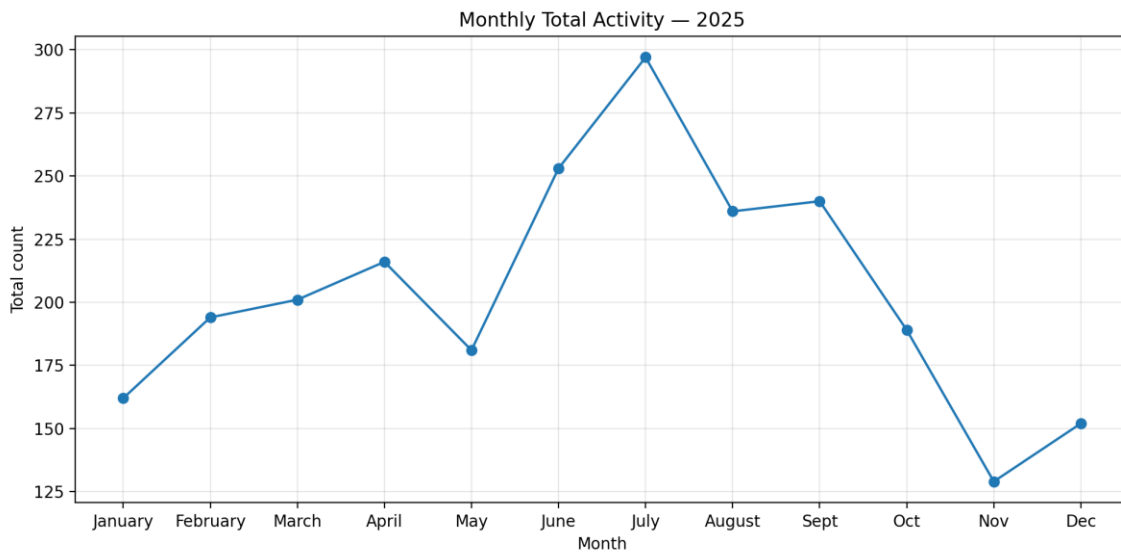

Fire & Life Safety Division

2025 Annual Report

Executive Summary

In 2025, the Fire & Life Safety (F&LS) Division completed 741 fire & life safety inspections where people eat, sleep and gather. These included multi-family dwellings, assisted living, memory care, restaurants, bars, theaters, churches, day care centers, schools and industrial locations. 550 new construction plan reviews were completed for various types of residential, commercial and industrial buildings. The Fire & Life Safety was also involved with input on various transportation projects within the District, ensuring that proper response routes, turning radius and traffic calming measures were complied with. This year the Fire & Life Safety Division implemented and completed the delivery of a \$75,000 wildfire defensible space grant and completed 367 wildfire defensible space assessments.

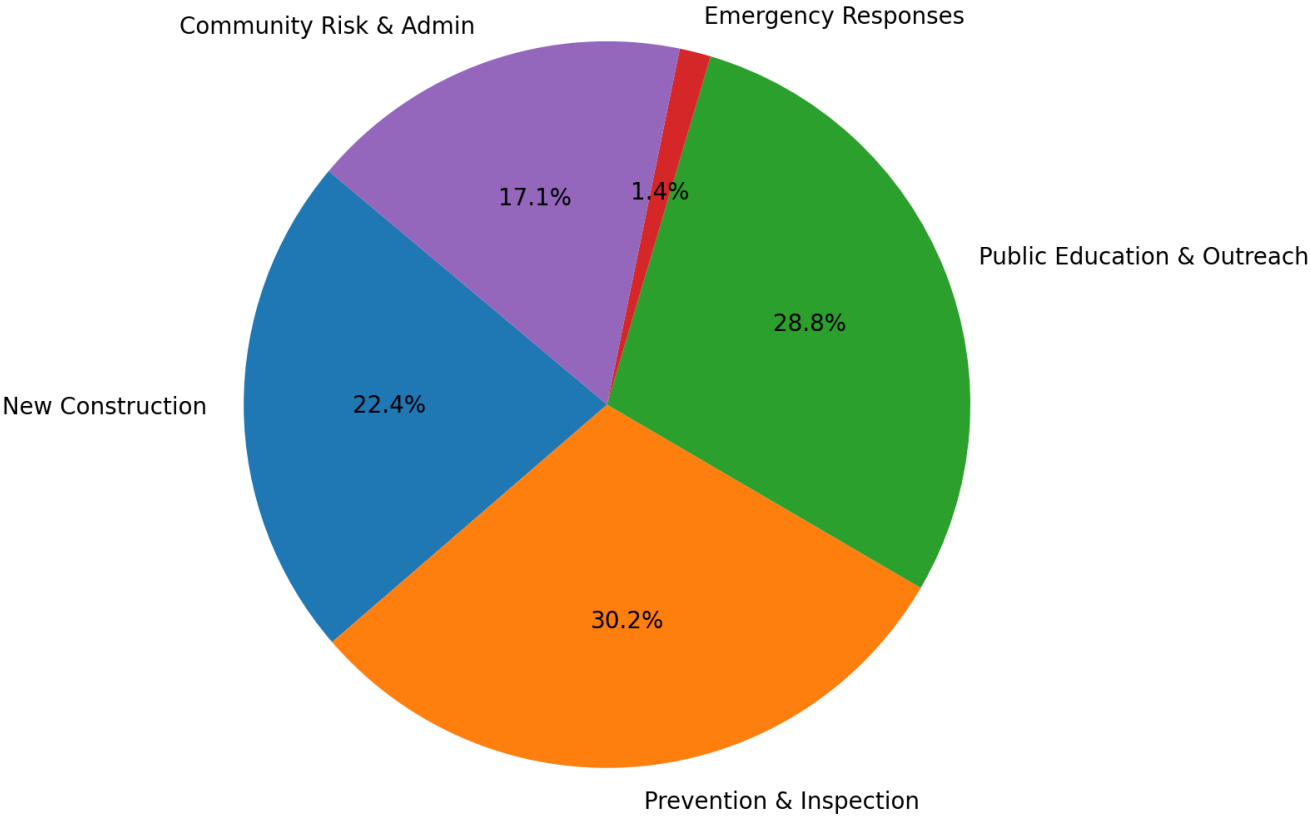

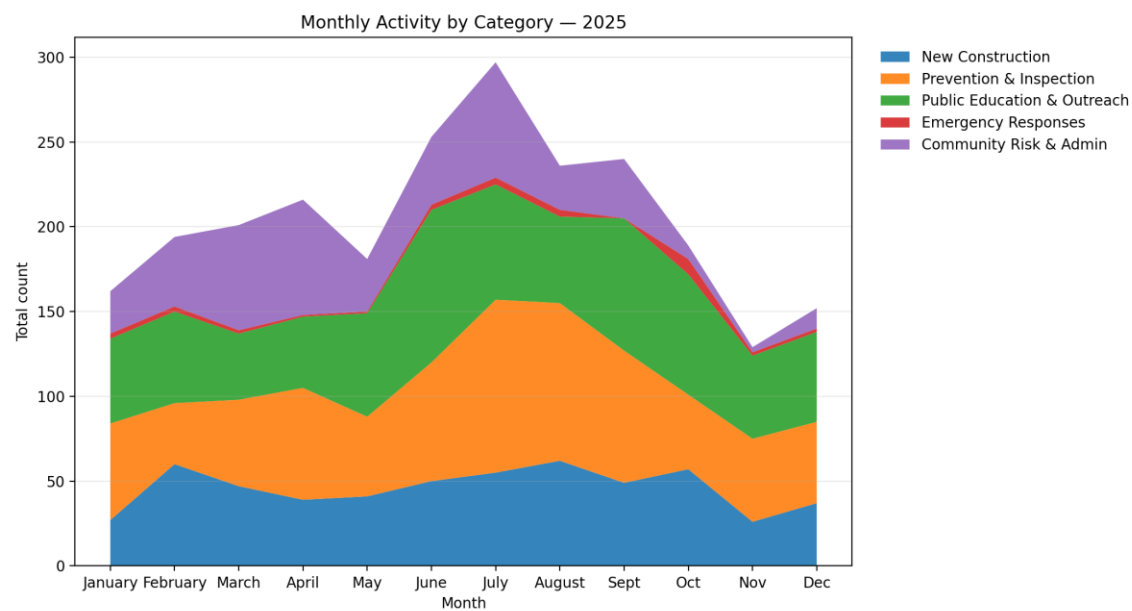

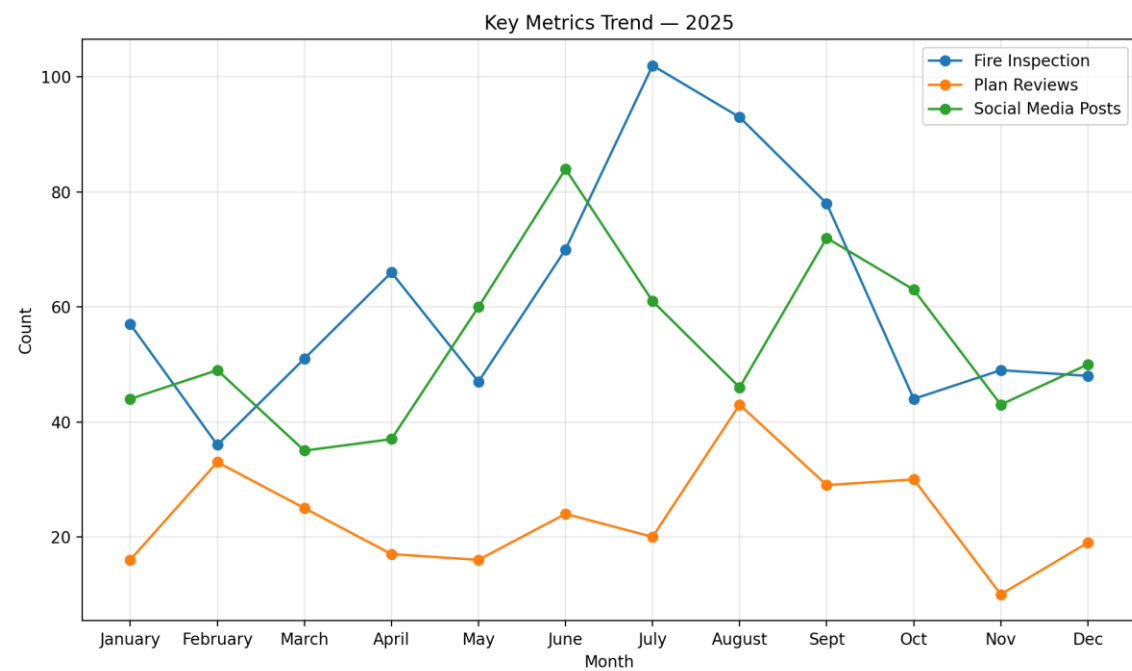
Activity Distribution by Category — 2025

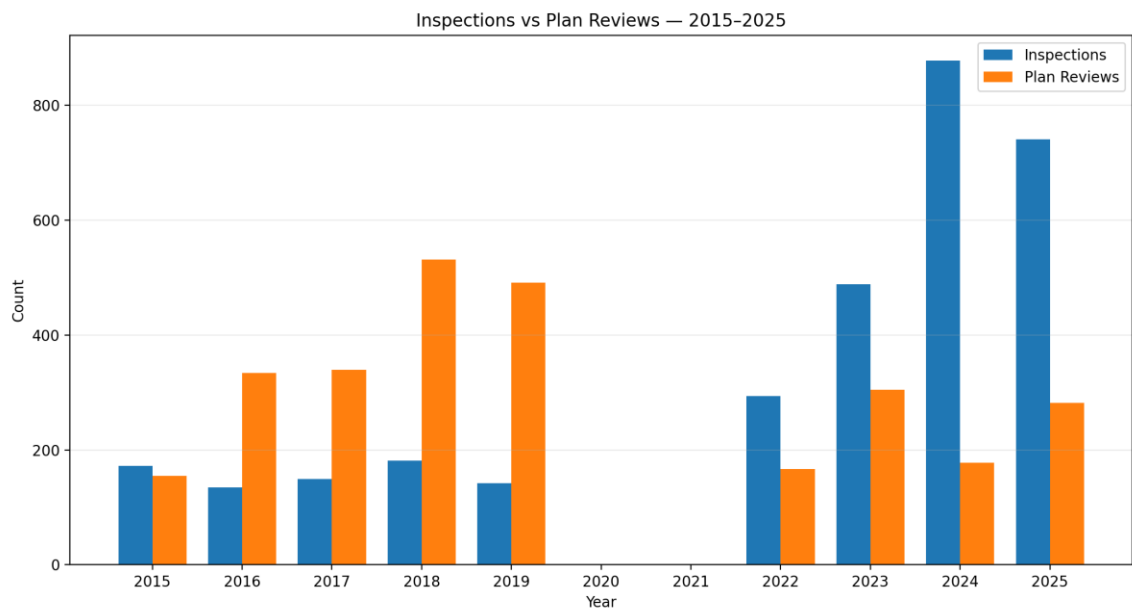
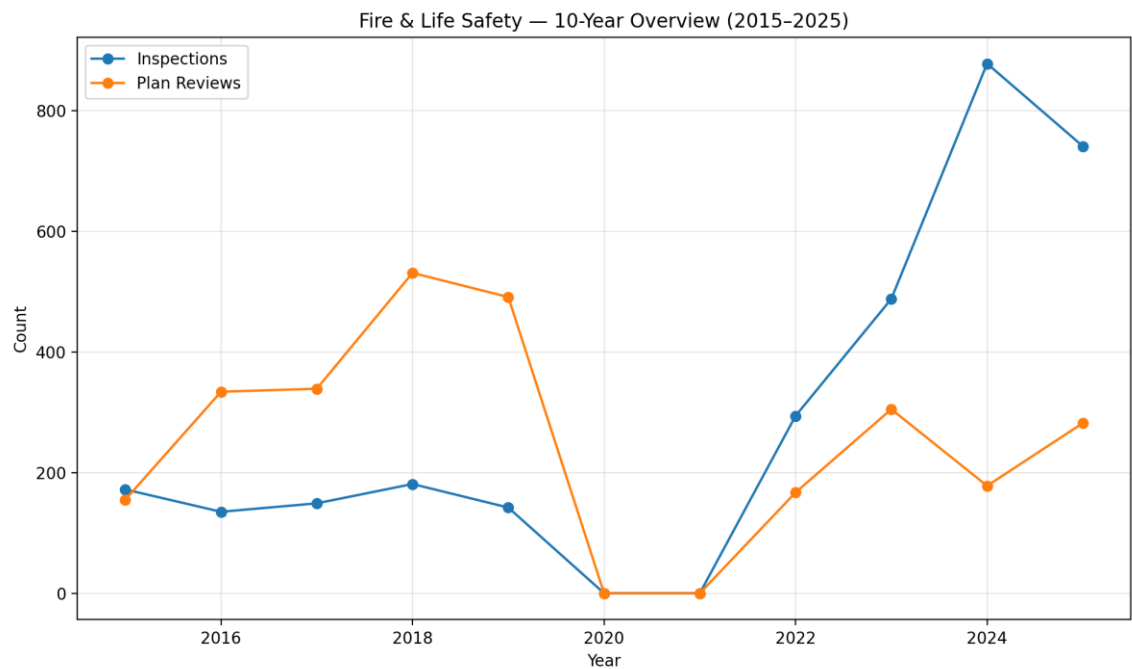

2026 Priorities

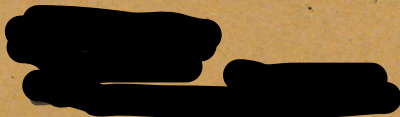

December 17, 2025

BOARD PRESENT: President Jessica Meyer, Vice President John Blanton, Secretary/Treasurer Earl Fisher, Member Gary Ollerenshaw, and Member Dick Knorr.

STAFF PRESENT: Fire Chief Ryan Herrera, Deputy Chief Dustin Miller, Human Resources Manager Diane Cox, Fire Marshal Tom Mooney, Battalion Chief Steve Fiero, Captain Luke Jerome, Captain Matt Crawford, Battalion Chief Garrick Terry, and Administrative Assistant Katie Annen. Captain Kevin Broadsword and Confidential Administrative Specialist Jessica Jackson attended virtually.

STAFF ABSENT: None

PUBLIC PRESENT: None

CALL TO ORDER: President Meyer called the meeting to order at 9:31 am.

ROLL CALL: All present.

AGENDA CHANGES: Addition of operations and training reports.

PACKET DOCUMENTS FOR INFORMATION:

Member Ollerenshaw mentioned it was good to see FireMed in the positive. Member Meyer thanked us for including the budget award in the board packet.

CONSENT AGENDA:

1. Meeting Minutes – November 19, 2025

Board Member Fisher made a motion to approve the Consent Agenda as presented. The motion was seconded by Board Member Blanton and approved by unanimous vote.

PUBLIC COMMENTS: None

PUBLIC PRESENTATION: None

REPORTS:

Chief Miller stated that the department is on track to receive approximately three hundred (300) more calls this year than in the previous year. He also reported on recent promotions and completed training. Additionally, Chief Miller noted that the department is currently in the process of auctioning surplus radio equipment and other miscellaneous items. He further explained that the HVAC systems are nearing the end of their service life and that cost estimates for replacement are being explored.

Chief Fiero gave an update on PPE. All crew members will have two (2) sets of turnouts. Gear must be cleaned after each fire and must be sent to NW Safety Clean in Oregon City to get inspected and repaired. New extrication rescue pants and jackets have just been ordered. These will provide flame and abrasion protection, will reduce wear/tear on structural firefighter turnouts, and will reduce fatigue and heat stress to rescuers. He also went over crew member achievements.

Captain Matt Crawford presented a fire training update. Classes 24-01 and 25-01 are almost complete with training, with a few delays due to injuries/illness/pregnancy. He discussed DPSST certifications, program completions, and new fire employees.

Captain Luke Jerome gave an EMS review of 2025 and went over a “Get To-Do” list for 2026. Staff are currently in the interview process for a new physician advisor, as Dr. Hahn has accepted two (2) promotions. Additionally, he went over some 2025 Q4 highlights.

Member Blanton expressed his sincere thanks to all the training chiefs & captains and noted that he is very proud of the organization.

ACTION ITEMS:

1. Annexations

Fire Marshal Mooney presented the board with three resolutions, 2025-23, 2025-24, and 2025-25, representing requests from citizens to annex into the district.

Board Member Fisher made a motion to approve Resolution No. 2025-23, 2025-24, and 2025-25, annexation for last names Oliver, Adamski & Vardanega to come into the fire district. The motion was seconded by Member Ollerenshaw and approved by unanimous vote.

2. Terminating Public Procurement Authority

Chief Herrera presented the board with Resolution No. 2025-26 to authorize the termination of Redmond Fire & Rescue District’s Public Procurement Authority Agreement in accordance with ORS 190.010.

Board Member Fisher made a motion to terminate the Public Procurement Authority Agreement. The motion was seconded by Member Ollerenshaw and approved by unanimous vote.

FIRE CHIEF COMMENTS:

Chief Herrera gave the Board a report on the following topics:

1. Redline Leadership

Thirteen (13) individuals completed the Redline Leadership program during 2025, which worked on High-Performance Leadership and Professional Development.

2. Strategic Plan

Chief Herrera gave an executive overview of the strategic plan. He will continue to update the board regularly on the progress of the plan goals.

NEW BUSINESS:

Member Meyer noted that there are ninety (90) days until Chief Herrera's anniversary. The Board will begin to work with Diane on the evaluation process.

OLD BUSINESS: None

BOARD MEMBER COMMENTS:

Member Fisher thanked Fire Marshal Mooney and all the staff that participated in the food drive, as it is so great for the community.

Member Blanton wished everyone a Merry Christmas, a safe and happy holiday with families and thanked everyone for all they do. He also shared a letter about wildfire protection and gave kudos to Fire Inspector Christa Deckrow for her work.

Member Knorr wished everyone a Merry Christmas.

SUBJECT: ADOPTION OF OREGON FIRE CODE

Report in Brief:

District staff are requesting approval to adopt the 2025 Oregon Fire Code as written and with the following appendices A, H, I, J, K, & L.

Appendices:

A-Board of Appeals

H-Hazardous Material Management Plan and Inventory Statement Instructions

I-Fire Protection Systems-Noncompliant Conditions

J-Building Information Sign

K-Construction Requirements for Existing Ambulatory Care Facilities

L-Requirements for Firefighter Air Replenishment Systems

Background – Fire Code:

Under ORS 478.910, a Rural Fire Protection District may adopt a fire code. In consultation with legal counsel, staff is recommending the Board approve the Fire Code Ordinance to coincide with the Oregon State Fire Marshal's (OSFM) recent adoption of the 2025 Oregon Fire Code.

The Oregon Fire Code is updated approximately every three years and is created by using the International Fire Code which is referred to as the model code. During a fire code update, Oregon amendments are added to the code. Once the State adopts the code it can then be adopted locally within each jurisdiction. Each jurisdiction is allowed to be more restrictive as the fire code is a minimum requirement. If a jurisdiction decides to be more restrictive, they must then adopt the Oregon Fire Code along with any ordinances that apply to the fire code. Within the code there are certain appendices that are not adopted by the State and must be done through local ordinance if they choose to.

Discussion – Fire Code:

By adopting the Oregon Fire Code as a District this gives us the ability to be more restrictive in certain applications of the fire code. We would then create an ordinance that would address any local amendments to the fire code. Many jurisdictions will undergo this process to address certain unique aspects of their District. I will work with all three counties and the city to make sure that RF&R is on their agendas for upcoming meetings so that these agencies can approve RF&R's fire code ordinance by resolution as required by [ORS 478.924](#).

Fiscal Impact:

There is no financial impact to the District by adopting the Oregon Fire Code.

Recommendation/Suggested Motion:

REDMOND FIRE & RESCUE

ORDINANCE NO. 6

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING FIRE CODES AND STANDARDS FOR REDMOND FIRE AND RESCUE, A FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT, PROVIDING FOR A REASONABLE LEVEL OF LIFE SAFETY AND PROPERTY PROTECTION FROM THE HAZARDS OF FIRE, EXPLOSION OR DANGEROUS CONDITIONS IN NEW AND EXISTING BUILDINGS, STRUCTURES, AND PREMISES AND TO PROVIDE SAFETY TO FIREFIGHTERS AND EMERGENCY RESPONDERS DURING EMERGENCY OPERATIONS.

WHEREAS, Redmond Fire & Rescue, a Fire Protection District, has developed uniform fire regulations for the jurisdictions served; and

WHEREAS, Redmond Fire & Rescue, a Fire Protection District, hereinafter referred to as the District, finds it necessary to adopt regulations that establish a minimum level of fire safety, thus does hereby adopt the following regulations;

NOW, THEREFORE IN CONSIDERATION OF THE FOREGOING; IT IS ORDAINED AS FOLLOWS:

TITLE AND FILING:

This ordinance, including the codes hereby adopted, shall be filed with Oregon State Fire Marshal and shall be posted at each fire station of the District as prescribed by ORS 478.940. From the date on which this ordinance shall take effect, provisions thereof shall be controlling within the territorial limits of the District and within each city and county within the District which similarly approves these provisions pursuant to ORS 478.924.

SCOPE:

The purpose of this code is to establish the minimum requirements consistent with nationally recognized good practices for providing a reasonable level of life safety and property protection from the hazards of fire, explosion or dangerous conditions in new and existing buildings, structures and premises and to provide safety to firefighters and emergency responders during emergency operations as authorized by ORS 478.910.

SECTION I - ADOPTION OF THE DISTRICT'S FIRE CODE:

For the purpose of prescribing regulations governing conditions hazardous to life and property from fire or explosion, except as amended under Sections II, the Oregon Fire Code adopted by the Oregon State Fire Marshal, as it is replaced and amended from time to time, is hereby adopted as the District's Fire Code. It is the intention of this ordinance that the District from time to time shall automatically adopt the latest Oregon Fire Code including any amendments as adopted by the Oregon State Fire Marshal without any additional action necessary by the District. The District also adopts the following appendices in the Oregon Fire Code, Appendix A, H, I, J, K, L, & M. Such codes and amendments are adopted on the effective date of the administrative rule adopted by the Oregon State Fire Marshal.

SECTION II - ENFORCEMENT OF FIRE CODE

Notwithstanding provisions in the Oregon Fire Code authorizing or requiring inspections of buildings and premises, issuance of permits, review of plans, testing of fire protection systems and equipment, or provisions providing for enforcement of the Code, such inspections, plan review, permits, testing, and enforcement of the Code shall be discretionary by the Chief and other individuals charged by the Chief with such activities. The District recognizes that it has limited financial resources with which to provide fire, rescue, and other services and functions and is forced to make public policy decisions as to allocation of District resources. Although the District places a high priority on prevention, inspection, and maintenance of fire systems, due to financial limitations, it is the Board's policy to require inspections, plan review, permits or testing only, so often as necessary, to provide a reasonable level of fire and life safety. Accordingly, although the Fire Chief and other individuals charged by the Chief with these activities are encouraged to pursue performing such activities, as well as the scope and frequency of such activities, the performance of such activities shall be within the discretion of the Fire Chief. It is the intention of the District to make clear that the District's duty to perform the inspections, plan review, issuance of permits and testing, or to take enforcement actions as set forth in the Code, is limited to providing a reasonable level of fire and life safety.

SECTION III - AMENDMENTS TO THE OREGON FIRE CODE:

There are no amendments to the Oregon Fire Code adopted by the Oregon State Fire Marshal.

SECTION IV - FEES

Cost based fees may be imposed for plan review, inspections, permits or other fire code related services the District is authorized or required to provide under the Fire Code or other applicable statute or regulation, as prescribed in the District's Master Fee Schedule.

SECTION V-PENALTIES

Any person who violates any of the provisions of these regulations hereby adopted or fails to comply therewith, or violates or fails to comply with any order made thereunder, or who builds in violation of any detailed statements, specification or plans submitted and approved thereunder and from which no appeal has been taken, or shall fail to comply with such an order as affirmed or modified by the Board of Appeals or by a court of competent jurisdiction within the time affixed herein, shall severally, for each and every such violation and non-compliance respectively, be guilty of a violation of the Fire Prevention Code as provided in ORS 478.930, punishable upon conviction as prescribed by ORS 478.990. All fines or punishments authorized upon conviction shall include the costs to the District to remedy the violation including costs of towing, storage, or removal of the hazard or obstruction if necessary.

The Chief or designated representative may bring a complaint in law or in equity to alleviate a violation of this ordinance as well as in addition to the rights to enforce said ordinance under the provisions of ORS 478.930 and ORS 478.990.

- . Reinspection fees may be applied for failure to correct violations in accordance with the District's Master Fee Schedule in addition to any other penalties.

SECTION VI - FIRE CODE BOARD OF APPEALS

As authorized by ORS 479.180, the District may establish a board of appeals. Such board of appeals may be implemented through bylaws and standard operating guidelines adopted by the District.

SECTION VII - REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES

The provisions of this ordinance, i.e., the Fire Code, shall be controlling within the territorial limits of the District and within each city and county within the District approving pursuant to ORS 478.924. If an existing fire code ordinance has been approved within any city or county within the District, the District desires that the existing fire code continue in effect until such time as the cities and counties within the District have approved this new Fire Code pursuant to ORS 478.924. Accordingly, all former ordinances or parts thereof, which are conflicting or inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance or of the code or standards hereby adopted, are hereby repealed, effective on the effective date of this ordinance. Further, prosecutions or violations under repealed ordinances may continue after the effective date of this ordinance.

SECTION VIII - VALIDITY

The District hereby declares that should any section, paragraph, sentence, or word of this ordinance or of the Codes or Standards hereby adopted be declared for any reason to be invalid, it is the intent of the District that it would have passed all other portions of this ordinance independent of the elimination of any such portion as may be declared invalid.

SECTION IX- DATE OF EFFECT

The Board of Directors of the District finds and determines that it is necessary and expedient that the provisions of this ordinance become effective 30 days following adoption, as authorized by ORS 198.570.
